

National Geographic Highlights an Arkansan and His Experience with Cystic Fibrosis

Last month, Dr. Larry Johnson and Dr. Keyur Vyas were mentioned in *National Geographic* in an article titled "This crippling disease often goes under-diagnosed - unless you're white." The article discusses cystic fibrosis (CF) and an Arkansan's journey to receiving his diagnosis.

Terry Wright grew up in Little Rock with a severe and chronic stomach pain. He would be at the hospital for sinus infections, pneumonia, or severe pain for weeks at a time only to be back in three months. Terry would not be diagnosed with cystic fibrosis until the age of 54. Sixteen years, prior he was told, "if you were not Black, I would say you had cystic fibrosis." CF is considered one of the most common inherited diseases in white Americans, however statistics show that it is even more common among African Americans, South and East Asians, Hispanics, and Africans.

In 2016 Terry's wife, Michele, brought him to UAMS to seek out an infectious disease specialist after his lung infections were failing to improve with antibiotics. Here they were treated by Dr. Keyur Vyas who ordered a diagnostic test after noticing his symptoms were similar to CF and began seeing Dr. Larry Johnson for treatment. A late diagnosis of CF can be very dangerous for patients as it can cause serious lung damage and harmful outcomes. Dr. Johnson believes Terry could have been overlooked as it was rare to see a case of CF outside of pediatrics when he was first suspected of the illness in 2000.

To raise awareness for CF among African Americans, Terry and Michele founded the National Organization of African Americans with Cystic Fibrosis (NOAACF). 


Gut Club




