


Research Symposium 2023

Dr. Pearl McElfish 2023 Faculty Excellence in Mentoring (Research Category)

Dr. Pearl McElfish was recognized with the 2023 Faculty Excellence in Mentoring award in the area of research. Dr. McElfish has formally mentored over 30 students, post docs, and junior faculty, but she goes above and beyond by informally mentoring faculty, staff or students whenever she is asked. She has been at UAMS since 2012, when she founded the Division of Community Health and Research, and has been a

member of faculty since 2013. Dr. McElfish is the highest funded researcher at UAMS. She has brought in more than \$180 million dollars in external funding. In addition to founding the Division of Community Health and Research, because of her work, the office has grown to over 150 staff members who are implementing community-based research statewide. She also recruited one of only two Marshallese, US-trained physicians in the world, Dr. Sheldon Riklon, to UAMS. Congratulations, Dr. McElfish!



UAMS Doctors Recognized for Marshall Islands Research

Drs. Pearl McElfish and Jennifer Andersen were acknowledged recently for their outstanding work targeting type 2 diabetes and hypertension within the Republic of the Marshall Islands. Dr. Andersen's paper, *Faith-Based Health Screenings for Marshallese Adults Living in the Republic of the Marshall Islands: Study Design and Results* was published in the journal

Frontiers in Public Health. In late May, UAMS team members were invited to join the Republic of Marshall Islands' delegation to the World Health Organization Summit. Afterward, UAMS participants signed an official agreement with the RMI Ministry of Health and Human Services to strengthen their partnership and continue their collaborative work toward a better state of health for all Marshallese communities.

UAMS Endocrinologist Speaks at Endocrine Society's Annual Meeting

Dr. Joseph Henske, associate professor of medicine in the Division of Endocrinology and director of the diabetes program, recently spoke at The Endocrine Society's press conference on diabetes during the group's annual meeting in Chicago. Dr. Henske's presentation, "Real-World Survey of Adherence to Guidelines Regarding Type 1 Diabetes and Aerobic Exercise," featured the results of a study conducted in collaboration with Dr. Arwa Albashaireh, assistant professor of medicine in the Division of Endocrinology, and medical student Gavin Beach. By utilizing social media groups, Dr. Henske and his colleagues surveyed experienced athletes with long-standing type I diabetes to understand their exercise habits, their glucose control, and their compliance with guidelines on the management of diabetes in exercise. "Many people learn about managing diabetes in exercise not from the guidelines," Dr. Henske revealed. He said that of those who responded to the survey, "the majority of [them] received their information not from their medical team, but from other sources" such as trial and error and social media groups. Moreover, the study revealed several discrepancies between guideline recommendations and respondents' practices. Dr. Henske noted that these discrepancies present significant opportunities for better patient education and for increased awareness of the guidelines among physicians and patients alike.


