Thakkar wins Innovation in Biotechnology Award

Shraddha Thakkar, graduate student in the UAMS/UALR Bioinformatics Program, was lead author of a paper titled "Design and In Vitro Testing of Structure-driven Mutations of an Anti-methamphetamine Therapeutic Single Chain Antibody with Subnanomolar Affinity". The paper was selected by the American Association of Pharmaceutical Scientists for an Innovation in Biotechnology Award. Thakkar presented her research at the association's May conference.



The article titled "Resveratol Improves Renal Microcirculation, Protects Tubular Epithelium, and Prolongs Survival in a Mouse Model of Sepsis-induced Acute Kidney Injury," was co-authored by faculty member and mentor Philip Mayeux, Zhen Wang (recent graduate of the Pharmacology Graduate Program), Kathryn Graduate Seelv (graduate of the Toxicology Gokden Program), and Neriman (Associate Professor of Pathology).

FACULTY NEWS

Medical School Curriculum Update

The 2012-2013 academic year has introduced significant changes in the College of Medicine curriculum for Medical Students. The first two years of the Medical School curriculum is transitioning from department-based lecture courses (ie, Medical Pharmacology, Medical Physiology) to a series of multi-disciplinary Team-Based Learning (TBL) segments focused on organ systems (ie, CNS, cardiovascular). New teaching sessions include TBL in which medical students choose and initiate treatments based on pathologies presented in the computerized human simulation laboratory. In parallel, new graduate coursework was introduced in our Pharmacology and Toxicology Graduate Programs under the direction of Professors Paul Gottschall and Lee Ann MacMillan-Crow, respectively.

Faculty promotions in 2012



Professor Alexei Basnakian was awarded the title of Research Career Scientist at the Little Rock VA Medical Center for a five-year period beginning October 2012. The RCS Award provides support for outstanding scientists who perform research at VA Medical Centers across the country. Applicants are judged on funding history, productivity, and impact on their research field. Basnakian's laboratory is funded by the NIH and the Veterans Administration to explore organ injury caused by endogenous cytotoxic DNA endonucleases (DNases). His research team also pursues translational research to define the role of carbamylated low-density lipoprotein (cLDL) in experimental and human atherosclerosis.



W. David Wessinger was promoted from the rank of Associate Professor to Professor of Pharmacology and Toxicology with tenure. Wessinger is the Director of the Interdisciplinary Biomedical Sciences (IBS) Graduate Program and the Director of the UAMS M.D./Ph.D. Program. He oversees the training of more than 80 students, including 33 IBS PhD students, 21 medical scientist (MD/PhD) students, and 14 Masters degree (MS) students, and others. He is a Co-investigator on NIH grants to which he contributes expertise in behavioral pharmacology.

Sung Rhee was promoted from the rank of Assistant Professor to Associate Professor of Pharmacology and Toxicology with tenure. Rhee was the recipient of a prestigious 4-year Scientist Development Grant (SDG) from the American Heart Association and currently is funded by a R01 grant from the NIH National Heart Lung and Blood Institute (NHLBI) to study abnormalities of vascular scaffolding proteins during hypertension. His research interests include using ion channel genes as therapeutic agents to normalize blood pressure and defining molecular mechanisms that regulate the trafficking and expression of ion channels in vascular muscle cells during hypertension.



As a valuable secondary faculty member, **W. Brooks Gentry** was promoted from the rank of Associate Professor to Professor of Pharmacology and Toxicology. Gentry's primary appointment is in the Department of Anesthesiology where he achieved the rank of Professor in 2006. Gentry is a popular lecturer in the Medical Pharmacology Course and also contributes to graduate education in the Department of Pharmacology and Toxicology. He has partnered with department faculty, most notably with Professor Mike Owens, to design monoclonal antibodies against drugs of abuse, test them in experimental animal models and ultimately bring them to clinical trials.

Mayeux receives outstanding mentor award



Professor Philip Mayeux was selected as the Outstanding Mentor for 2012 by the UAMS Graduate School. He is the inaugural recipient of this award, and was nominated by his predoctoral students. Mayeux is the Director of Education for the Department of Pharmacology and Toxicology. He has mentored six graduate students and one postdoctoral fellow during the past ten years. Three of his recent trainees have won predoctoral training grants from the NIH or from the American Heart Association.

Zimniaks retire from UAMS

In October, the Department of Pharmacology & Toxicology wished a fond farewell to Drs. Piotr and Ludwika Zimniak, who officially retired November 1, 2012. The Zimniaks joined the department in 2002 with Piotr as a Professor and Ludwika as a Research Associate Professor. During the past 10 years, their NIH-funded research focused on the physiological and toxicological role of lipid peroxidation in obesity and aging. Piotr also was the recipient of a VA Research Career Scientist Award. The Zimniaks retired to California to be closer to family. We miss them but wish them all the best!



Remembering Dan Sheehan (1944-2012)

It is with sympathy that we report the death of Dan Sheehan on May 3, 2012. Dan received his undergraduate and Master's degrees from the University of South Florida in Tampa, and his PhD from the University of Tennessee at Oak Ridge. For many years, he was an active adjunct faculty member in the Interdisciplinary Toxicology Graduate Program at UAMS.
