including research and training the next generation of cardiovascular scientists







We recently learned the sad news that **Terry** Sims, Ph.D., a College of Medicine faculty member from 1978 to 2007, died Nov. 6, 2024. Dr. Sims initially joined the Department of **Pathology** and then served in the Department of **Anatomy** (now the Department of **Neurosciences**), where he taught gross anatomy to medical students for over two decades until his retirement. As a scientist, Dr. Sims specialized in cell regeneration with a focus on the brain and spinal cord. READ MORE
